


## **Vol 17 - No 2** REMOVING DAMAGED EXTENSION CORDS FROM SERVICE






Extension cords are commonplace on construction sites. Job site hazards and hard use make extension cords prone to damage. When this happens, they must be removed from service. There are three effective ways of doing this:

- The most common is figure 1. If the damage is to either end, or anywhere along the length of the cord, you may cut the cord at that point. YOU MUST MAKE SURE THE EXTENSION CORD IS DISCONNECTED FROM ANY POWER SOURCE at this time.
- 2) You may also remove the extension cord from service by tagging it as shown in figure 2. The text on the tag should explain clearly as to the status of the cord.
- 3) A third way is wrapping the extension cord in brown electrical tape as shown in figure 3. The color brown signifies the item is unserviceable.


In all cases the extension cord must be removed from use and put in the storage area or removed from the job site. If the extension cord is to be thrown away it should be destroyed so it cannot be used by anyone.




